Dear members, dear godparents and supporters,

In the last newsletters we pointed out the need to introduce a sustainable financing model for the organisation and explained why we increased the monthly contributions for new sponsors from 12 to 17 euros. We also emphasized that existing sponsorships are not affected by this increase in contributions, but we are of course happy when long-term members voluntarily raise their contributions.

And that is exactly what many of you did. A big thank you from the whole team in Germany and Cambodia!

Time to look at what happened during the last weeks:

Free eye-care for the villagers:

Many people in the Cambodian countryside suffer from eye disease and various visual impairments. Cataract for example, a disease that leads to the clouding of the eye lens, can ultimately result in total loss of vision if not treated properly. Since the majority of Cambodians do not know what cataracts are and cannot pay for diagnosis or treatment of the desease anyway, you come across many people suffering from impaired vision if you travel through the Cambodian countryside.

Many villagers in the communities we work with are suffering from various eye

problems. We were therefore very glad when Khmer Sight Foundation, an organisation that provides free eye care for people in need, offered to the people of our villages, checkups and treatment wherever it was deemed necessary. Khmer Sight Foundation is a Cambodian NGO that simply wants to help Cambodians to see again. They do this by inviting and enabling





missions consisting of eye specialists and volunteers from countries around the globe, who provide free treatment and surgeries at various Cambodian hospitals during their stay in the country.

Khmer Sight also works with Cambodian volunteers and med students to provide them with the training they need to become eye specialists in the future. Six of these students visited our school on a Saturday in August and with the help of Khemara, Matthias and Phil, they provided free check-ups for more than 150 villagers. Aside from conducting eye tests, the volunteers immediately started handing out eye drops and the right glasses to whoever needed them. Many patients that were diagnosed with cataract and pterygium have already received free surgery and report a significant improvement in vision. They told us that they are very grateful for the opportunity to receive these treatments.

While having lunch with the Khmer Sight volunteers, we learned that they go to a different village nearly every weekend. The fact that these young Cambodians do this on top of what must be very stressful studies was very impressive and inspiring. It became clear from the beginning, that all of them do this with a lot of dedication and that they are aware of how important this work is. These people made a lasting impression on us and we want to express our sincerest thanks towards them and the Khmer Sight Foundation!

experience he gained while doing this will help him in the classroom and enables us to offer an additional Jiu Jitsu class from now on. Aside from this, him and Matthias will continue to conduct various seminars for the students in Phnom Penh.
