Increased project and administrative costs

Our costs here in Cambodia are made up of different components. There are regular expenses like the monthly payments to the families of our godchildren as well as cost for transportation, salaries, rent etc. And there are irregular expenses for medical care for our beneficiaries and the staff, or the maintenance of the school and the dormitories.

Unfortunately, our costs have risen considerably in 2018/2019. This is due to the fact that the Cambodian authorities are demanding ever higher fees - for

example for the extension of our registration as an NGO. In addition, taxes on salaries and our company car have been introduced in 2018. An additional tax on rent for the dormitories has been added in 2019. Due to the lack of tenant protection, landlords simply pass this tax on to tenants. Our additional cost from taxes alone therefore mount up to around \$200 per month.

What does that mean for us and you? All in all, we are still doing well financially. Over the years, we have saved enough reserves to be able to pay even larger, unforeseen bills when need be. Nevertheless, it is important to point out and react to these increased costs, as we need to guarantee that we always earn at least as much as what we spend. Otherwise, the reserves that have been saved up for years would continue to shrink and we would have no way of piloting new projects or providing emergency aid in crisis situations.

Therefore, please consider whether you can afford to support us by making regular donations. Any donation that is not bound to a specific usage (e.g. the payment of tuition fees) will be used for direct NGO purposes only. Meaning whatever is not used to pay for administrative costs like tax, can then be spent to cover additional project costs. E.g. to pay for repairs in the dorms or getting new equipment for the school

Students and teachers master the #TrashTagChallenge

In addition to a lot of back and forth while dealing with various Cambodian authorities, the events here during last three months have mainly been dominated by the issues of extreme drought (see newsletter March 2019) and environmental protection. In May, it finally rained properly for the first time and an end to the drought is in sight. The resulting floods, however, will sweep away into the rivers all the rubbish that has been thrown carelessly into the streets, rivers and countryside over the months of drought.

The inadequate waste-management is a problem throughout the year, but it becomes particularly apparent during the first large rains, when the water masses cannot drain due to clogging caused by all the plastic waste and



everything else that has accumulated in the sewerage system during the dry season. Once this happens, everything is pushed upwards and lands back on the very streets where it was disposed from. This is not only disgusting, but also a considerable health and safety risk. Roads become impassable. Potholes or even open manhole covers become invisible. People are either unable to move or expose themselves to considerable dangers if they move anyway. It is therefore high time that something changes in the Cambodians attitude to garbage. Something that also applies to many people in the so called "developed countries".

The #TrashTagChallenge2019 therefore seemed like a very appealing viral trend from the Internet. These challenges are something that spreads quickly and is almost never missed by any youth around the world once the challenge "goes viral".

After our former employee Claudia asked if we plan to take part in the challenge, everything moved very fast. Michael informed the teachers and they talked to their students who had already heard about the challenge. The enthusiasm to be able to take part in something like this was accordingly great. A little later Khemara and Tharith set off with their classes. You can see the result on the before/after pictures on the next page of this newsletter. We were thrilled!

We are aware that something like this can only be a small contribution to the big problem of waste management. Our aim is to keep the topic present among our students with such initiatives. In the end it will hopefully be the young Cambodians themselves who will change their attitude and solve the problem themselves. The success of the Fridays for Future movement gives us hope!

Teacher training in Phnom Penh

Thanks to a generous donation from the Living Responsibilty Fund (LRF) of Deutsche Post DHL, in 2019 all our teachers will be able to participate in training courses at the Educational Development Institute (EDI) in Phnom Penh. The EDI is one of the first private institutions in Cambodia to offer additional vocational training for professionals.

Thanks to the donation from the LRF, we can now offer all our teachers to participate in one of the TESOL² courses at EDI. These courses take place several times a year. So our teachers can choose whatever starting time suits them best.

The approximately three-month long courses cover the following areas:

- Teaching professionalism
- Educational Psychology
- teaching concepts
- teaching methods
- Designing lesson plans
- Peer teaching rehearsal
- Teaching internship (teaching live in front of a class)

Two teachers have already completed the course. Two more are currently attending the course. The remaining teachers have already indicated that they will seize the opportunity and participate in one of the courses in the third or fourth quarter.

Many thanks to Deutsche Post, DHL and the Living Responsibilty Fund, who have been supporting us regularly for years now. Such appreciation is our best thanks for our work.

New fans for the English school

If you have already been to Cambodia or Southeast Asia you will know this: It is incredibly hot and humid all year round. A proper ventilation in the classrooms is therefore an absolute must. This year's dry season was especially long and hot. Many of the old fans had gradually given up. It therefore came as no surprise

when our teachers expressed their wish for new fans during one of our last teacher conferences.

Because we were of the opinion that many of the old models gave up too quickly, we asked our teachers which of the brands that you can source locally offer the best quality products. We were then recommended a Thai company. Their fans would be much sturdier than cheaper "no name models" from China.

Due to a pregnancy and health problems of other teachers, he had to lead about half of his classes alone while now and then falling back on the translation and help of Tharith and the other teachers in the neighboring rooms. We can only take our hat off to the calm and serenity with which he mastered this task.
